

Anthemis arvensis

[Synonyms : *Anthemis arvensis* var. *agrestis*]

CORN CHAMOMILE is an annual or perennial. Native to Europe it has nearly scentless daisy-like yellow-centred, white flowers.

It is also known as *Acker-Hundskamille* (German), *Ackerkamille* (German), *Ager-gåseurt* (Danish), *Åkerkulla* (Swedish), *Antemido agra* (Esperanto), *Anthémis des champs* (French), *Bastard camomile*, *Bebuna tar-raba* (Maltese), *Camri'r Ýd* (Welsh), *Ci gan ju* (Chinese), *Fausse camomille* (French), *Feld-Hundskamille* (German), *Field camomile*, *Field chamomile*, *Hundskamille* (German), *Hvit-gåseblom* (Norwegian), *Kvit-gåseblom* (Norwegian), *Magarza* (Swedish), *Manzanilla bastarda* (Spanish), *Manzanilla silvestre* (Spanish), *May weed*, *Peltosauramo* (Finnish), *Rmen rolní* (Czech), *Ruman rol'ný* (Czech), *Rumian polny* (Polish), *Tian chun huang ju* (Chinese), *Valse kamille* (Dutch), and *Wilde kamille* (Dutch).

Warning – persistent contact with the leaves and flowers can cause dermatitis. Milk and other dairy products from cattle grazing the plants can be contaminated and have a disagreeable taste.

Arvensis means 'of or growing in cultivated fields or land'.

Medicinally, it has been used locally to treat worms and for healing wounds.
