Lamium galeobdolon

[Synonyms : *Galeobdolon luteum*, *Galeopsis galeobdolon*, *Lamiastrum galeobdolon*,
Lamiastrum galeobdolon subsp. *montanum*, *Lamium luteum*, *Leonurus galeobdolon*]

YELLOW ARCHANGEL is a perennial. Native to western Europe it has small greenish-brown-blotched, yellow flowers.

It is also known as Archangel, Bee-nettle, *Bergguldplister* (Swedish), *Bonte gele dovenetel* (Dutch), Dead nettle, Deaf-and-dumb, Dumb nettle, Dummy nettle, Dunny nettle, *Gelbe Taubnessel* (German), *Gewöhnliche Goldnessel* (German), *Goldnessel* (German), *Gold-Taubnessel* (German), *Guldlister* (Swedish), *Guldplister* (Swedish), *Gulsuga* (Swedish), *Hluchavka pitulník* (Czech), *Hluchavka žltá* (Slovak), *Lamier jaune* (French), Lion's snap, *Marddanhadlen Felen* (Welsh), *Pitulník žlutý* (Czech), Snuff candle, Stingy-wingies, Weasel's nose, Weasel snout, Yellow dead nettle, and Yellow snout.

The flowers are pollinated by bees.

Galeobdolon is derived from Greek *gale-* (weasel) and *bdolos* (disagreeable odour) components.

Medicinally, herbalists recommended it for the same ailments as white dead-nettle (*Lamium album*), over which it was often preferred, and especially for treating ulcers and sores.
