Sedum morganianum

DONKEY'S TAIL is a succulent evergreen perennial. Possibly native to temperate areas of Mexico it has small pink or red flowers.

It is also known as Beaver-tail, Burro's tail, Horse's tail, and Lamb's tail.

The flowers secrete large amounts of nectar.

Morganianum commemorates, for some authorities, a Dr. Meredith Morgan of California who grew donkey's tail and is said to have seen it flower in cultivation for the first time in 1938.

Authorities say that the natural habitat for donkey's tail is still uncertain because it is known that there were similar plants in cultivation nearby when Eric Walther discovered it in Mexico in 1935.
