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Tabebuia serratifolia

YELLOW POUI is a deciduous shrub or tree. Native from Middle America to Bolivia it has small golden-yellow flowers.

It is also known as Apamata, Gold tree, Guayacan polvillo, *Ipê-amarelo* (Brazilian), Trumpet tree, Washiba, Washiba wood, and Washibi.

Serratifolia is derived from Latin *serratus* (jagged, cut) and *-folia* (leaved) components meaning 'with serrated or saw-toothed leaves'.

The flower is a national emblem of Venezuela.

This hard and heavy, durable wood is resistant to decay and insects and can be called green ebony, Surinam greenhart and in Brazil *pao d'arco*. It is used for carving, construction and cabinetwork.
